• To obtain the longest lifespan of your outdoor products, minimizing exposure to direct sunlight is recommended.



• Children should not climb or jump on the furniture.



 Do not write on furniture without a padded barrier to protect the surface.



 To obtain the longest lifespan of your outdoor products, avoid extended and lengthy exposure to rain, snow, and direct sunshine. Whenever possible cover the product and /or place under patio or awnings.



 Stains may be removed with mild soap solution and damp cloth.



 Dust and pick-up spills using a clean, non-colored, lintfree cloth.

Please look in Bench for hardware packs and legs.


Sets often ship in multiple boxes and may arrive a day or two apart.

• Do not assemble on flooring or carpet-




• Assemble on a clean non-marring surface (packing foam)-




Save all packaging until finished-

Assembly Steps




This Bench has multiple parts and may repuire up to 30 minutes to assemble. To give you an overview of the bench parts, the above picture is to help you put the various parts into perspective. Please read through the instructions below to familiarise yourself with the parts and steps before assembly.

Step 1




Open the carton and place all the parts onto a clean, non-marring surface. Attach the Seat(C) to Right leg (A) with Nut (①)using the Wrench(③). **Do not fully tighten the Nuts.**

Step 2



Attach the Seat(C) to Left leg (B)with Nut(①)using the Wrench(③). **Do not fully tighten the Nuts.**

Step 3



Attach the Leg Support(D) to Right and Left leg with Bolt(②) using the Allen Wrench (④).

Do not fully tighten the Bolts.

Step 4



Place the Bench on a LEVEL SURFACE.

Inspect it and make sure all parts are adequately connected.

Gently and gracefully, sit into to the Bench.

This would help to align all the parts at all the joint areas.

Then get off the Bench, and in a sequential manner, proceed to tighten all nuts and bolts.

To tighten the Nuts at the base of the Backrest, do secure assistance from your adult partner(s).

You may be required to turn the Bench, to gain easy access to the secure points. Turn the Bench in a synchronised manner.

CAUTION 1: When tightening these nuts and bolts, tighten sequentially. DO NOT tighten any nuts and bolts fully and then towards the next one. This would cause the frame to warp.

If there is still wobbles, loosen the nuts and execute this same process. WARNING!! IF BENCH IS NOT STABLE, IT COULD LEAD TO DAMAGING THE PRODUCT.

Ensure all nuts are fully locked into position.

Step 5

Questions & Answers about Proposition 65

What is Proposition 65?

Proposition 65 requires businesses to provide warnings to Californians about significant exposures to chemicals that cause cancer, birth defects or other reproductive harm. These chemicals can be in the products that Californians purchase, in their homes or workplaces, or that are released into the environment. By requiring that this information be provided, Proposition 65 enables Californians to make informed decisions about their exposures to these chemicals.

Proposition 65 also prohibits California businesses from knowingly discharging significant amounts of listed chemicals into sources of drinking water.

Proposition 65 requires California to publish a list of chemicals known to cause cancer, birth defects or other reproductive harm. This list, which must be updated at least once a year, has grown to include approximately 900 chemicals since it was first published in 1987.

What types of chemicals are on the Proposition 65 list?
 The list contains a wide range of naturally occurring and synthetic chemicals that include additives or ingredients in pesticides, common household products, food, drugs, dyes, or solvents. Listed chemicals may also be used in manufacturing and construction, or they may be byproducts of chemical processes, such as motor vehicle exhaust.

· What does a warning mean?

If a warning is placed on a product label or posted or distributed at a workplace, a business, or in rental housing, the business issuing the warning is aware or believes that it is exposing individuals to one or more listed chemicals.

By law, a warning must be given for listed chemicals unless the exposure is low enough to pose no significant risk of cancer or is significantly below levels observed to cause birth defects or other reproductive harm.
