## Care & Maintenance



- Not for commercial use. For residential use only.



- Furniture may scratch floors. We recommend using furniture pads to protect your floors.



- Do not put hot items directly on furniture surface.



- Do not clean furniture with harsh cleansers or polish.



- Do not place furniture under direct sunlight.



- Do not place furniture near heating or cooling vents.



- Do not write on furniture without a padded barrier to protect the surface.



- Do not place furniture outside . For indoor use only.



- Stains may be removed with mild soap solution and damp cloth.




- Children should not climb or jump on the furniture.

**Please look in chair for hardware packs and legs.**



## Parts List

Label	Picture	Description	QTY
A	A line drawing of the backrest part of the chair. It is a curved, shell-like shape with two small legs at the bottom, representing how it would be attached to the seat.	Backrest	1
B	A line drawing of the seat part of the chair. It is a rounded, rectangular shape with a slightly raised front edge, representing the main body of the chair without the backrest or legs.	Seat	1
C	A line drawing of a single leg part of the chair. It is a curved, C-shaped piece with two small circular holes, representing the leg that fits into the seat and backrest.	Leg	4



- Do not assemble on flooring or carpet-




- Assemble on a clean non-marring surface (packing foam)-



- Save all packaging until finished-


# Assembly Steps

## Overview



This chair has multiple parts and may require up to 30 minutes to assemble. To give you an overview of the chair parts, the above picture is provided to help you put the various parts into perspective. Please read through the instructions below to familiarise yourself with the parts and steps before assembly.

## Step 1





Open the carton, and place all parts on a clean, non-marring surface.  
Take out Seat(B), Leg(C). Turn the Seat(B) over.  
Align the holes on the four Leg(C) with the holes on the bottom of the seat(B).  
Use Bolt(①) with Allen Wrench(⑤) to lock it.

**Do Not Fully Tighten the Bolts.**


## Step 2

Note that the backrest needs to be inserted at an angle, not perpendicular to the seat.



Put Backrest(A) to the two holes of seat, and under first two holes, there are another two holes, the bolts of Backrest need across another two holes on below board as shown.


## Step 3



Use Washer(2), Nut(3) with Wrench(4) to tighten it as shown.

**Fully Tighten the Bolts.**

Step 4



Place the Chair right side up and tested for stability.

Your Chair is ready for use.

This Chair can only be used on a flat, level surface.

## Questions & Answers about Proposition 65

- What is Proposition 65?

Proposition 65 requires businesses to provide warnings to Californians about significant exposures to chemicals that cause cancer, birth defects or other reproductive harm. These chemicals can be in the products that Californians purchase, in their homes or workplaces, or that are released into the environment. By requiring that this information be provided, Proposition 65 enables Californians to make informed decisions about their exposures to these chemicals.

Proposition 65 also prohibits California businesses from knowingly discharging significant amounts of listed chemicals into sources of drinking water.

Proposition 65 requires California to publish a list of chemicals known to cause cancer, birth defects or other reproductive harm. This list, which must be updated at least once a year, has grown to include approximately 900 chemicals since it was first published in 1987.

- What types of chemicals are on the Proposition 65 list?

The list contains a wide range of naturally occurring and synthetic chemicals that include additives or ingredients in pesticides, common household products, food, drugs, dyes, or solvents. Listed chemicals may also be used in manufacturing and construction, or they may be byproducts of chemical processes, such as motor vehicle exhaust.

- What does a warning mean?

If a warning is placed on a product label or posted or distributed at a workplace, a business, or in rental housing, the business issuing the warning is aware or believes that it is exposing individuals to one or more listed chemicals.

By law, a warning must be given for listed chemicals unless the exposure is low enough to pose no significant risk of cancer or is significantly below levels observed to cause birth defects or other reproductive harm.
