Caution: You must read these Assembly Instructions before you proceed

Care & Maintenance



- Do not put hot items directly on furniture surface.



- Do not clean furniture with harsh cleansers or polish.



- To obtain the longest lifespan of your outdoor product minimizing exposure to direct sunlight is recommended.



- Children should not climb or jump on the furniture.



- Do not write on furniture without a padded barrier to protect the surface.



- To obtain the longest lifespan of your outdoor products, avoid extended and lengthy exposure to rain, snow, and direct sunshine. Whenever possible cover the product and /or place under patio or awnings.



- Not for commercial use. For residential use only.




- Stains may be removed with mild soap solution and damp cloth.



Keep your child/children at bay during the assembly process.

- Do not assemble on flooring or carpet-




- Assemble on a clean non-marring surface (packing foam)-

Assembly Steps


Overview



FRONT FACING


This Table has multiple parts and may require up to 30 minutes to assemble. To give you an overview of the Table parts, the above picture is to help you put the various parts into perspective. Please read through the instructions below to familiarise yourself with the parts and steps before assembly.

Step 1




Unpack and place all parts on a clean, non-marring surface.

Step 2




Connect the 2 Leg Frame (A) and the Crossbar (B) together using Bolts (2) and Washer (1), then use Allen Wrench (3)
Do not fully tighten the Bolts.

Step 3




Then connect to the Table top (C) using Bolts (2) and Washers (1) then use Allen Wrench (3) to tighten them.
Do not fully tighten the Bolts.

Step 4



Fully tighten the Bolts

You can increase or decrease the foot base to make the table surface more level.



With the help of your adult partners, stand the Table up.

Exert pressure floorwards, onto the Table with both your hands.

This pressure will help the Legs and Table Top reach full alignment status

Check for wobbles on a LEVEL surface.

If no wobbles are found proceed to tighten the Screws in a sequential manner, until evenly secured.

When tightening the Bolts, Screws tighten sequentially.

Do not tighten any Bolts and Screws fully and then move on towards the next one.

If there are still wobbles, loosen the Screws and execute the same above process.

Your Table is ready for use.

This Table can only be used on a flat, level surface.

Questions & Answers about Proposition 65

• What is Proposition 65?

Proposition 65 requires businesses to provide warnings to Californians about significant exposures to chemicals that cause cancer, birth defects or other reproductive harm. These chemicals can be in the products that Californians purchase, in their homes or workplaces, or that are released into the environment. By requiring that this information be provided, Proposition 65 enables Californians to make informed decisions about their exposures to these chemicals.

Proposition 65 also prohibits California businesses from knowingly discharging significant amounts of listed chemicals into sources of drinking water.

Proposition 65 requires California to publish a list of chemicals known to cause cancer, birth defects or other reproductive harm. This list, which must be updated at least once a year, has grown to include approximately 900 chemicals since it was first published in 1987.

• What types of chemicals are on the Proposition 65 list?

The list contains a wide range of naturally occurring and synthetic chemicals that include additives or ingredients in pesticides, common household products, food, drugs, dyes, or solvents. Listed chemicals may also be used in manufacturing and construction, or they

may be by products of chemical processes, such as motor vehicle exhaust.

• What does a warning mean?

If a warning is placed on a product label or posted or distributed at a workplace, a business, or in rental housing, the business issuing the warning is aware or believes that it is exposing individuals to one or more listed chemicals.

By law, a warning must be given for listed chemicals unless the exposure is low enough to pose no significant risk of cancer or is significantly below levels observed to cause birth defects or other reproductive harm.
